ACHIEVEMENTS COMMUNITY EVENTS

Catrine has always seen a high level of community activity and over the years have had many successful projects and events, from environmental to activity and social. ACHIEVEMENTS COVID-19 PARTICIPATORY BUDGETING

During the Coronavirus Epidemic in Spring 2020, local volunteers pulled together to assist local community members with shopping, prescription deliveries, befriending and food parcels.

Supported by East Ayrshire Council's Vibrant Communities Service X volunteers helped X local community members during this time.
