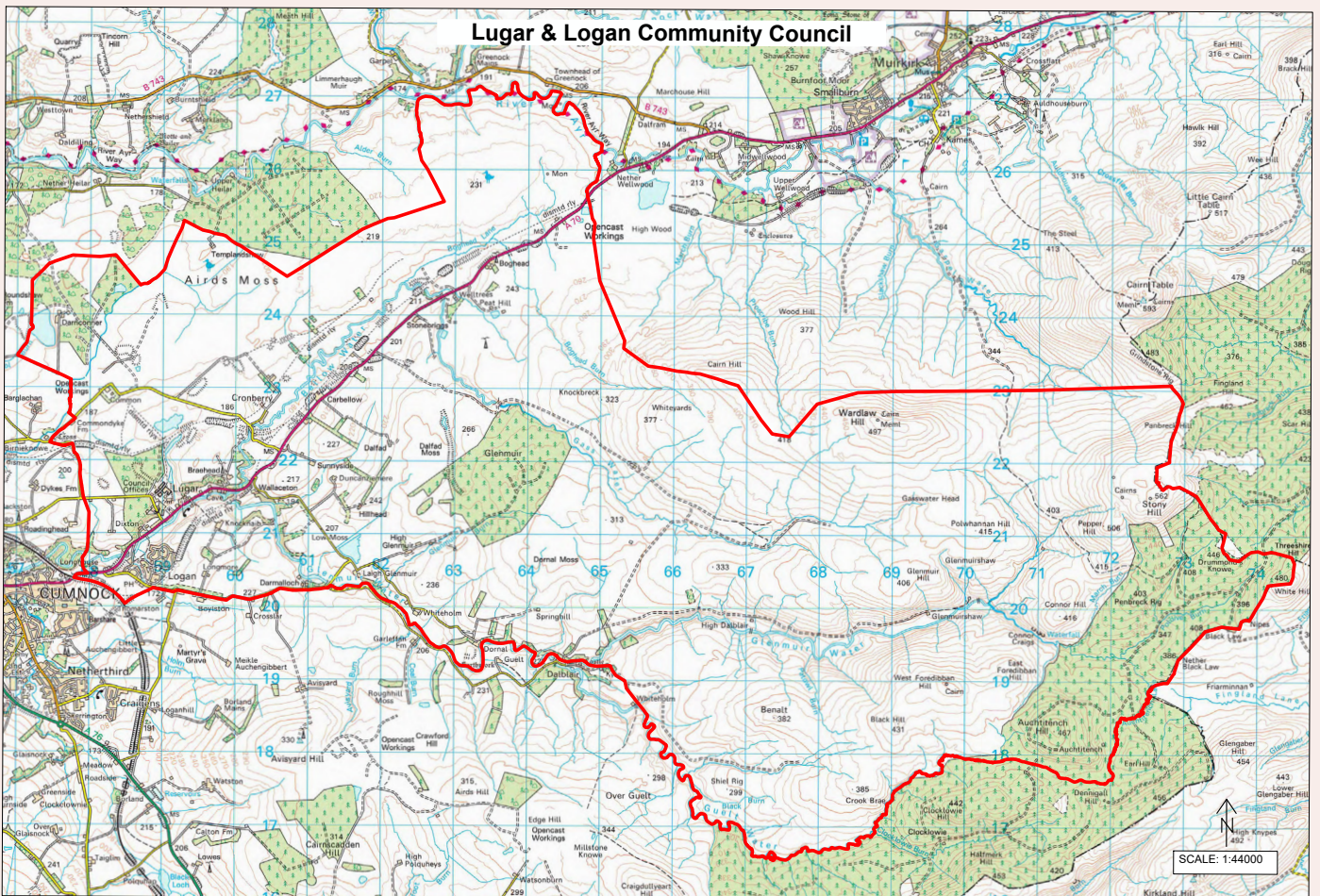

Introduction

What is a Community Action Plan?

An action plan seeks to engage a community in identifying priorities for their area and to encourage the community into making those priorities happen. The Community Empowerment Act (Scotland) 2015 is a law that helps communities to influence change in their area.

A community action plan requires a 40% household survey return and is developed for the whole community not just one group. This means that every group within the area can use this plan as evidence of need when starting up a group to take forward actions or when applying for funding.

This plan is not a list of things that will be done for us, it's a plan to get us all involved in making changes happen to enhance our area and offer various opportunities.

Our first plan had some great achievements including:

- The Spoot Heritage Site has been upgraded
- Further enhancement to the community garden
- Retaining Logan Day Centre
- Litter team set up
- Fun days and events organised
- Development of Lugar Parish Church Heritage Information Centre
- Set up of a community larder and warm hub
- Enhanced entrances
- Installation of defibrillator
- Rendering of Social Housing
- Upgrade of road to Lugar Church

Second Generation Plan

The steering group is made up from a range of local Volunteers and representatives from a wide range of local organisations. These include Community Council, Logan Day Centre, Toddler and Youth Group, Lugar Parish Church, Lugar Boswell Thistle Football Club, Lugar Bowling Club, Logan Boxing Club and Cronberry Residents Association.

This Community Action Plan sets out the priorities for the development of Cronberry, Logan and Lugar over the next 5 years as decided by the community through a comprehensive process of community engagement.

A total of **285** household and online responses were returned with community views, which is a **52%** return of surveys. **56** of them were returned from young people in schools. **95** people attended and voted at the voting event and **11** stakeholder meetings were completed.

The plan is for the whole community with the aim of bringing groups, organisations and residents from all three areas to get involved and support services, facilities and community events. The research and preparation was organised, and led by the Cronberry, Logan and Lugar Action Plan Steering Group during 2021-2022.

The aim of the group:

- To give the community an opportunity to come together to plan and realise the changes needed to improve their communities for the future.
- Share views and ideas.
- Raise awareness of the communities.
- Work in partnerships with all the groups in the communities.
- Work with the whole community to achieve the priorities identified within this plan.

The Process involved:

- A household survey delivered to every household within the communities.
- An accessible online household survey shared via social media.
- Stakeholder interviews with representatives from different groups and individuals with a vested interest in the communities.
- Children and Young People's survey conducted in Primary and Secondary Schools.
- A community profile produced detailing the facts and figures of the communities.
- A community voting event giving local residents the opportunity to vote on their top priorities.



Our Community Now

Location

The parish of Lugar, an area of approximately 80km², encompasses the three settlements of Cronberry, Logan and Lugar and 11 farm steadings.

Lugar and Logan lie approximately 1 mile East of Cumnock. The smaller settlement of Cronberry lies a further mile east of Lugar.

Facilities

In 2017, the Logan Day Centre Committee signed a lease from East Ayrshire Council to manage the day to day running of the Centre. This has been very successful, giving more groups the opportunity to meet and use the building. External funding has been secured to upgrade the kitchen and the building, making this a community hub within Logan. During the pandemic the committee set up a community food larder, where people who were struggling could use a dignified food provision within the community. The committee support a range of activities and events within the Centre, including a Gala week, Bag a Burger and Christmas events. The Committee have also received external funding to employ a Project Worker to assist with the running of the building and the groups who use the Centre.

Lugar Parish Church

Lugar Parish Church is in the process of developing a Heritage and Information Centre and Community Hub after receiving external funding. It is still a Church, but when developed it will also provide a hub, a meeting place for the Community and be part of the Coalfield Landscape Project. It will be open through the week and has disabled access, toilet facilities, parking, an I.T. unit for people to have access to the internet, a cafe preparing hot drinks and snacks, a picnic area, indoor and outdoor seating and information prepared through murals, maps and leaflets. There will also be Information boards covering a wider area, which will enable visitors and local people to maximise their knowledge of the area. It is the intention to develop the building as a Heritage Information Centre, that would highlight the importance of the area's industrial past including Baird & Son, William Murdoch and his invention of gas, Mining and our Covenanting heritage.



Volunteers

Logan, Lugar and Cronberry Community Council was re-established in 2018 after a period of inactivity. They now have a very active membership. The Community Council received external funding to improve and enhance the local areas. Volunteers regularly collect litter across the three communities. The Chairperson of the Community Council was awarded Cumnock Citizen of the year in 2021. He is also an active member of the nine Community Council steering group (9CC), which was established for the allocation of funds generated from the local Windfarms. This will ensure that community benefit money generated from Windfarms for the area is managed and distributed fairly across the nine communities within East Ayrshire.



Our Community Now

Cronberry Residents Association

During the Covid-19 pandemic, Cronberry Residents Association supported local residents with their shopping and collecting prescriptions and continue to be the voice of the village. The Association have also received external funding to have a picnic table built beside the pond, as this is a focal point for people to socialise and meet in the village.

Population

Overall, the population of Logan and Lugar has declined by 6% in the last ten years. The population was 1,333 in 2001, 1,260 in 2011 and the mid-year estimate in 2020 projected the population as 1,190. These statistics apply to Logan and Lugar and do not include the settlement of Cronberry. The estimated population of Cronberry in 2001 was 75. (Census 2011)



Lugar housing development

Housing

Over the last 5 years East Ayrshire Council have rendered **193** properties in Logan and **3** properties within Lugar. So far, there have been **184** properties externally rendered, **166** properties with new windows installed and **85** with new kitchens, bathrooms and rewiring completed. A further **9** external render works in Logan near completion. The development of **26** houses in Lugar are near completion. Currently there is one application for two new-build houses in Logan and there is an application for houses in Cronberry.

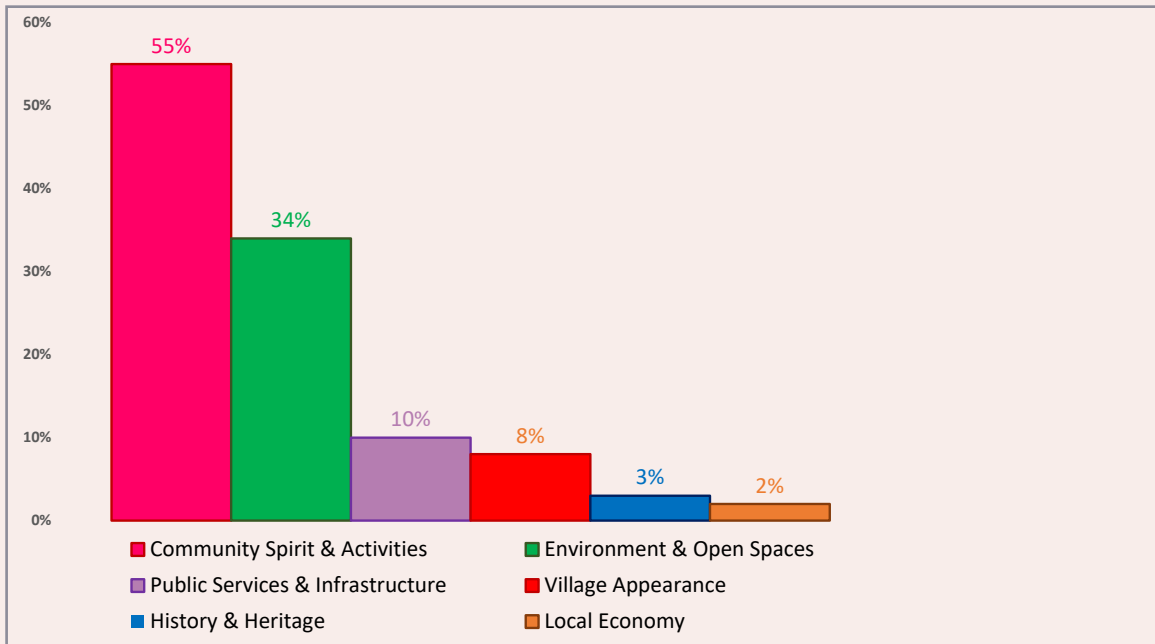
East Ayrshire Council, Vibrant Communities provide opportunities for adult learning within the community.

The nearest Colleges are in Kilmarnock and Ayr.

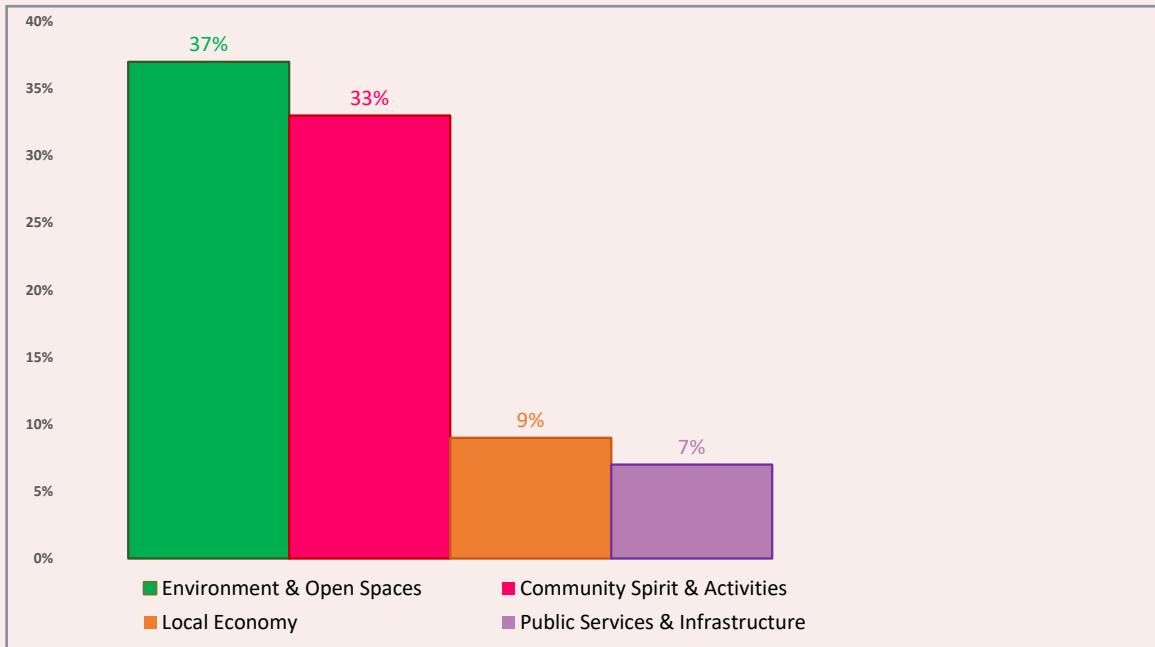

Did you Know?

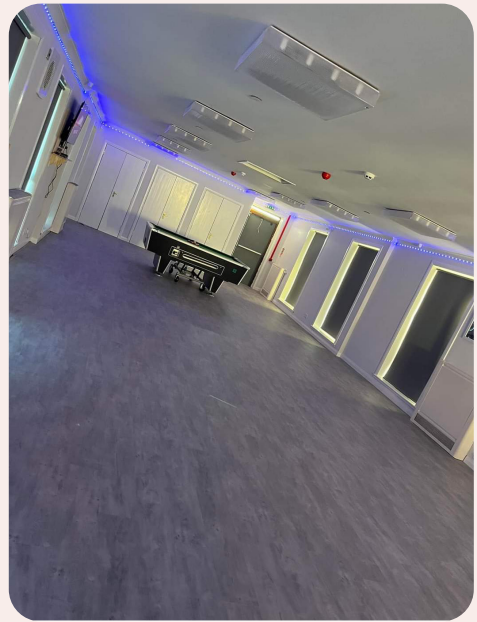
Lugar Boswell Thistle FC made nine consecutive Scottish Cup appearances in the 1880's. In March 1883 they recorded a 10-2 victory over Hearts. This still remains the Edinburgh clubs record defeat.

Before and After

Please find below projects which have been refurbished since the first plan was launched. These include the upgrade of Logan Day Centre kitchen and hall, the development of Lugar Heritage Centre, the refurbishment of Lugar Church and the upgrade of Lugar Boswell Thistle Football Club kitchen area. All of these projects were supported from a range of funders including Renewable Energy Fund (REF), The Lintel Trust, Corra Foundation, Coalfield Community Landscape Partnership (CCLP), Shire Housing and East Ayrshire Council.

History

Lugar

There was some form of settlement in the Lugar area as far back as 1000B.C. A battle-axe was found dated from around that time. Two stone axe-hammers were found in the gravel bank of Lugar Waters. These are believed to date from the early Bronze Age Period. From a similar period is the Rocking Stone at Bello Path near Lugar. A large boulder of some tons in weight was set on top of two others. The exact purpose of the stone is not known, but no doubt its location was extremely significant to Bronze Age people.



The Spout

The Spout is a natural spring, with pure water that was commonly visited by locals who would fill a jug up to add to their whisky, as it was said to make it taste better. But for years the spout has lay untouched. In its glory days families would visit to enjoy the stunning views which are long gone. In 2020 during the lockdown period local volunteers from the village of Lugar came together to upgrade the spout using reclaimed materials, planting trees and flowers in memory of loved ones.

William Murdoch

William Murdoch (1754 - 1839) was born at Bello Mill, Lugar. Educated at a School in Cumnock, he assisted his father in the millwright business before moving on to work for James Watt and Mathew Boulton at the Soho foundry near Birmingham. Many of Murdoch's experiments in gas lighting were undertaken at a cave near Bello Mill overlooking the River Lugar. The cave can still be seen today. Although Murdoch never patented the idea, he prepared a paper on the subject for the Royal Society and was awarded the Rumford Gold Medal by them in 1808.

History

Logan

Present day Logan is built on the site of Logan House, there are photographic records. The settlement of Logan was greatly expanded in the post-war flurry of house building desperately needed to accommodate families from the mining villages. Logan Council housing scheme located above the valley of the Lugar Water. The community is set in open countryside on the outskirts of the Cumnock burgh. The minor road from the Glenmuir Water (NS6120) passes in front of the houses on its way to join the A70.



Cronberry

Cronberry (or Kronberry) dates back as far as 1654. The more recent Cronberry was built in the 1860's by the Eglinton Iron Company. Cronberry had seven miner rows set in lines and not streets or squares. In 1913 the population was approximately 600, and not a single washing house existed for the whole population. The Village was owned by William Baird & Co. The old miner's rows were demolished and the occupants rehoused in Lugar. Riverside Terrace houses were more modern, dating from 1920's and were converted to form private housing.

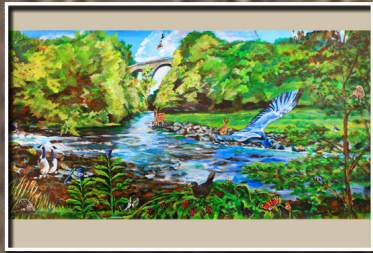

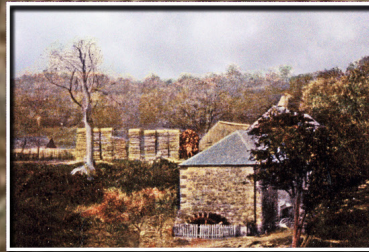

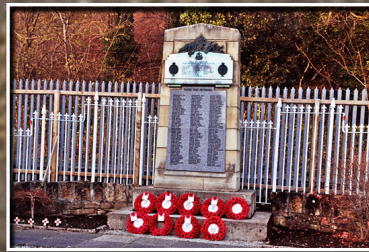
