INTRODUCTION

Netherthird, Craigens & Skerrington Community Action Plan Steering Group

The development of this Community Action Plan has been led by a local Steering Group which brought together representatives from Cumnock Landward Age Concern; Cumnock Landward Community Association; Four Connections Mother & Toddlers; Four Connections Youth Project; Netherthird & District Community Council; Netherthird Community Garden; Skerrington, Craigens & Netherthird Fun Day (SCAN); Skerrington & Netherthird Co-operative Women's Guild; Netherthird and District Wives & Mothers and active local community residents.

Giving Local People A Voice / Their Say

During the eight month period between March 2014 to October 2014, the Steering Group has undertaken an extensive community engagement process taking into account the views and ideas of local residents, voluntary community groups and partners with an interest in the development of Netherthird, Craigens & Skerrington Community Action Plan.

The process involved:

- A community views survey of every household within the area
- A young people's survey conducted through Netherthird Primary School and Cumnock Academy
- A series of 1:1 stakeholder interviews and focus groups
- Preparation of a community profile
- A community open event that enabled local residents to refine the priorities identified for the benefit of the community



419 COMMUNITY VIEWS SURVEY FORMS WERE RETURNED FROM 1044 HOUSEHOLDS.

99 SURVEY FORMS WERE RETURNED FROM THE PRIMARY SCHOOL.

70 SURVEY FORMS WERE RETURNED FROM YOUNG PEOPLE AGED 12 - 17.

29 STAKEHOLDER MEETINGS AND FOCUS GROUPS WERE HELD WITH LOCAL GROUPS, BUSINESSES AND SUPPORT ORGANISATIONS.

262 PEOPLE ATTENDED THE COMMUNITY EVENT.

OUR COMMUNITY NOW FACTS & FIGURES

We have summarised below some of the main facts and figures from the Community Profile that was produced by the Steering Group to give a picture of Netherthird, Craigens & Skerrington now.

BRIEF DESCRIPTION AND HISTORY

This is a fairly new community of under 70 years of age. The first houses were built at Skerrington, with the bulk of the houses in Netherthird commencing in 1951.

The estate was built mainly to re-house families from the outlying villages of Skares and Glengyron that were being demolished. The houses were also required to provide accommodation for miners and their families coming into the area from Fife and Lanark to man the new deep mines at Barony and Killoch, now long since closed.

ENVIRONMENT

The area sits on the southernmost outskirts of Cumnock surrounded by open countryside and farmland. The farms are made up mostly of mixed farms i.e. cattle, sheep and crops. Glaisnock Water and Holm Burn provide a habitat for fish, amphibians and insects.

Barshare Wood, Velvetere Wood near Glaisnock House and Ryderston Belt are some of several wooded areas which provide habitat for local wildlife and birds.

Barshare Wood is mostly made up of pine trees and is home to rabbits and wood pigeons. It is next to a river walk which has a variety of plants and trees surrounding it which encourages a variety of different birds to the area.



POPULATION & HOUSING

The population of the area currently served by the Netherthird & District Community Council stands at 2499. There are few empty houses and larger house sizes have lower occupancy than in the past, however construction of two new developments has enabled the population to remain fairly stable.

The Community Action Plan Steering Group identified 1044 residential properties within the area.

The social housing stock is 50-60 years old with the exception of James Young Avenue, which is younger. The majority of the social housing stock is managed by Shire Housing Association with the remainder managed by East Ayrshire Council and a small minority by private landlords. As the area was built to house larger families apart from the elderly complex, only a small quantity of three apartments are available.

TRANSPORT & ROADS

Sitting just at the main A76 road there is good access by car to Cumnock town centre and surrounding towns, however the access by bus service is very limited. A community transport service is offered to local groups through Coalfield Community Transport and dial-a-bus, which is managed through SPT to provide:

- Recreational and social activities.
- Access to local facilities including health centres and shopping centres.
- Visiting friends and hospital visiting.

Concerns have been raised over safety issues for buses entering the residential area, mounting kerbs and manoeuvring through parked cars. This also causes damage to pavements and kerbs that already require repair.

Drainage issues have been highlighted in Netherthird mainly at Glaisnock Valley Bowling Green, Netherthird Play Park, Netherthird Communal Car Park and the Playing Fields.

HEALTH & WELLBEING

The nearest doctor's surgery is in Cumnock. The practice offers an extended hours service and provides a variety of primary care services and specialist clinics.

There is a local community hospital based in Cumnock, however, there is no accident and emergency service available. The closest accident and emergency service is available at Ayr or Crosshouse Hospitals.

There is no local pharmacy in Netherthird. The closest pharmacies are Lloyds (x2), both based in Cumnock and a privately owned pharmacy based in Logan. All pharmacies offer a delivery service and repeat prescription service through the Tanyard Medical Practice.


East Ayrshire Council and a variety of private organisations deliver care services within the local area.

A free and confidential client orientated service is available to over 60's or those registered as disabled. The care and repair service offers advice and assistance to maintain or repair the home in order that people can live safely and comfortably in their own community for as long as possible.



MAIN STRATEGIES AND PRIORITIES



OPEN SPACES AND OUTDOOR RECREATION

Netherthird, Craigens & Skerrington sits on the (southern) outskirts of the main town of Cumnock. It has access to the countryside and lovely views. However, it is felt that access paths could be

improved and developed further to provide much easier access for members of the local area. The outdoor facilities that are currently available also require to be tidied up, further developed and work carried out to provide better drainage of these areas to increase usage.

Main priorities:

- Clear up and cut grass opposite Holmburn Road
- Develop skate park and bike park
- Develop new and upgrade existing countryside walks
- Upgrade swing park and pitches
- Develop all weather sports and football pitch
- Renovate Murray Park
- Landscape spare area between the bowling green and the community centre and the old club site
- Develop Glaisnock House for the benefit of the community

BETTER VILLAGE APPEARANCE

The local factory outlet has increased footfall to the area, however having the shutters closed all day on all of the shops within the small shopping area makes visitors think that these shops are closed. It is felt that opening these shutters and repairing the brick wall opposite would make the area more welcoming and help to increase usage of these local businesses. There is a problem with litter and dog fouling throughout the area. A local initiative to highlight this problem and a community litter pick will enhance the environment and give local residents a sense of pride in their area.

Main priorities:

- Remove dog litter and provide more bins
- Upgrade the shop area
- Give school a facelift
- Make use of empty buildings and sites
- Create a community hub and village square
- Organise a village clean up



MAIN STRATEGIES AND PRIORITIES



IMPROVE ACCESS TO SERVICES

The reduced bus service has had a negative impact on the local community making it more difficult to attend appointments or go shopping locally. The local roads and pavements are requiring work to repair potholes. Residents have raised concerns over safety issues with buses having to manoeuvre through cars parked inapporopriately. New street lighting does not appear to be adequate as some local residents have intimated that doorways are no longer visible at night. Children having to walk from Craigens along the main road to the primary school increases the risk of traffic accidents.

Main priorities:

- Roads and Transport
- Housing



IMPROVE COMMUNITY FACILITIES / ACTIVITIES

As there are very few facilities in the area, the survey results demonstrated a higher level of support to ensure that the community centre was saved from closure and kept as a focal point for residents in the area. The programme of activities should be further developed and better advertised to increase the participation of local residents. It is felt that it is important to keep such a facility to ensure the cohesion of the area and provide a sense of good community spirit within the area.

Main priorities:

- Provide more activities for young people
- · Open community centre at weekends
- Build a new school
- Better advertising of activities
- Develop an inter-generational community project
- Alter access road to the bowling green
