



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Ochiltree and Skares Community Action Plan Group

The Action Plan sets out the public views on the main priorities of Ochiltree and Skares for the next 5 years.

A steering group was formed in 2016 after 2 public meetings were organised. This brought representation from various groups and residents within the community, including Ochiltree Community Council, Ochiltree Pre-5 Toddler group, Spark of Genius Netherton, Church groups, Ochiltree Community Hub and Skares and Kin residents group. They also worked in partnership with residents, businesses, voluntary organisations, schools, local farmers and East Ayrshire Council Vibrant Communities.

Aims of the Action Group:

- To provide an opportunity for the communities to come together to plan and implement change.
- Share views and ideas of what needs to be changed in their communities.
- Raise the profile of their areas and celebrate achievements together.
- Work in partnership with all existing groups and identify gaps for improvement.
- Deliver a vision through the Action Plan for the next 5 years.
- Work with communities and partners to achieve the priorities identified in this plan.

How this was achieved?

197 community surveys were returned from **468** households


73 surveys from young people and schools

Over **175** people attended the Community Open Event and voted on their top projects for action



Our Community

We have summarised below some of the main facts and figures from the Community Profile, which was produced by the action group to give a picture of Ochiltree and Skares now...



Location

The village of Ochiltree is just under 12 miles due east of Ayr on the A70 to Cumnock and is the largest settlement in the community area. At its highest point the village is 145 metres above sea level, with the surrounding land rising to 350 metres.

Ochiltree (Ochiltref) is one of the oldest settlements in Ayrshire with evidence dating back to at least the Bronze Age and perhaps beyond. Its position on a hillside overlooking the Lugar Water and the Burnock Water was of strategic importance. It was given Burgh status in 1669. The village has historic associations with William Wallace, the Colville family, John Knox, the Covenanter's, Robert Burns, James Boswell and is the birth place and former residence of George Douglas Brown (House with the Green Shutters).

It has always been part of an agricultural community, but in the past also had many cottage industries including, snuff box making, cotton weaving, tile works, dye works and the manufacture of reaping tools. Until recently mining of minerals and coal had provided significant employment but with the demise of these industries the demography of our rural communities has changed as has employment opportunities.

Skares is located some three miles southwest of Cumnock. It used to have a football team called Skares Bluebells. Skares consisted of an older core of a village and three miner's terraces. They were called 'The Auld Raw', 'The New Raw' and 'The Tap Raw'. These were built as mining expanded in the area: today mining has gone except for the opencast mine behind Skares.

The current population of the community area is 761 (2013) and a significant proportion of the population is over 30 years old.

The population of Ochiltree has remained static in the last ten years from 752 in 2004 to 761 in 2013.

The current population of Skares is 36.

The main points to note are:

- Ochiltree community area has a smaller percentage of 16-29 year olds than regional and national figures.
- Ochiltree is in line with the percentage of over 60s in East Ayrshire and Scotland as a whole.



Housing

Ochiltree reports a higher level of owner occupied housing than the East Ayrshire and Scotland average. As a result, the area reports a lower level of rented accommodation from council than the East Ayrshire average.

The Highfield housing development along with other smaller scale developments has increased the proportion of privately owned homes within the village of Ochiltree. The general state of repair of the village is good with the result that it is an attractive place to stay. This is reflected in the maintenance of the school roll.

The designation of part of the village as a Conservation Area has ensured that it retains significant links with its heritage.

There are no social housing available at the moment through the Council in Ochiltree.

At present there are 16 houses in Skares with only 1 owned by East Ayrshire Council.

Employment



There are limited employment opportunities within the areas with more people commuting to work to Ayr, Kilmarnock and Glasgow.

Employment within the area is very limited although a number of small businesses exist. The nearby establishment of Egger Barony, the developments at Killoch, the restoration of local surface mines and the potential for wind turbine development are all factors influencing the communities economy and regeneration.

Transport

The local bus service is provided by Stagecoach, route 42 with buses running approximately every half hour passing through Ochiltree to Cumnock, Auchinleck and Ayr and with connections to Glasgow and Dumfries. A Coalfield Community Transport bus is also available by registration and request. This service is particularly valuable to Skares, which has no other transport links. A Day Hopper service provides a shopping and excursion service to individuals in receipt of benefits, older or unemployed people, lone parents, people with disability or who are geographically disadvantaged. An Away Hopper service is also available to members of the Day Hopper club.

There is a train station at Auchinleck (3 miles) which connects to Dumfries/Carlisle/Newcastle or Kilmarnock/Glasgow and another at Ayr (12 miles) with connections to Prestwick and Glasgow airports.

Although there is a reasonably good bus service to the village car ownership has increased dramatically in the last 20 years. Road connections are good and commutes to Glasgow are not uncommon.

The 2011 census indicates that there are 385 locally owned cars or vans in the area, although 17.7% of residents reported that they did not own a car or van.

Education

Primary

Ochiltree Primary School is located in the heart of the village. School attendance rates at Ochiltree Primary School have traditionally been higher than the authority average: In 2014/15 attendance was 1.0% higher than the authority average.

There are two secondary schools within the area located in Cumnock and Auchinleck, however most children in the area attend Auchinleck Academy.

The general consensus as evidenced by questionnaires is that the environment, rural lifestyle and general ambience of the Ochiltree/Skares community area are conducive to health and well being. However there is both direct and indirect evidence that the area has a high prevalence of serious health conditions notably coronary heart disease (CHD), cancer, stroke and transient ischemic attack (T.I.A). It is particularly concerning that figures for rates of occurrence of serious health conditions are considerably higher than East Ayrshire, Ayrshire and Arran and National averages. This in part may be due to lifestyle choices, lack of physical activity, poor diets and, or engagement in the past with high risk employment such as the local coal mining industry.

Another, and perhaps a more fundamental factor impacting the averages may just be the demographic fact that a significant proportion of the population is over 65 and therefore more likely to experience periods of ill health. Whatever the causes, old age health is a key issue in the Ochiltree and Skares area, which is evidenced by the high rate of 65+ emergency admissions (30,986 per 100, 000) and with 65% of the 65+ population being physically limited by long term health conditions.

Smoking behaviour:

One-third of the population are estimated to be regular smokers, a rate which is considerably higher than East Ayrshire, Ayrshire & Arran and National averages. The rate of lung cancer registrations in Ochiltree is considerably higher than East Ayrshire and national average rates.




Risk Behaviour

High rates of hospital admissions attributable to various risk behaviours including respiratory, digestive, coronary heart disease, cancer and cerebrovascular disease indicate a central issue of risk behaviour.

The high prevalence rates recorded by the Auchinleck Surgery / Ochiltree Clinic regarding: cancer, coronary heart disease (CHD), chronic kidney disease (CKD), diabetes, heart failure, hypertension and smoking-related conditions also supports the notion that risk behaviours are a factor to a considerable extent in the area.

Digestive disease and coronary heart disease admission rates in addition to the prevalence rates of hypertension and smoking-related conditions recorded in the area are particularly concerning as such figures were considerably higher than East Ayrshire, Ayrshire & Arran and National averages.

Such behaviours are often interlinked and will likely include substance use (tobacco, alcohol, and drugs), a lack of physical activity and poor diets.

Environment

Agriculture

Farming has played a massive role in shaping both the landscape and the culture of the Ochiltree and Skares area. From the earliest days of forest clearance and drainage through the establishment of tenant farms, the revolution in crop production and animal breeding of the 17th and 18th century, through the war years and the mechanisation and industrialisation of food production the agriculture sector has dominated local land use. Today the uncertainties of global markets and the ever present battle with product prices still challenges the farming community. Through all of this the generations of farming families have provided support to the wider community through the school, the church and as guardians of the landscape.

Forestry

The war years and the establishment of the Forestry Commission had a profound impact on the production of timber in the UK. The removal of woodlands and forests were reversed by the large scale planting of commercial forestry plantations. Whilst these new forests did not replace the indigenous woodlands they have developed to provide recreational opportunities and access to previous inaccessible areas. The North Kyle Forest Master Plan now offers the possibility of a major public area close to Ochiltree and Skares with possibilities of access and provision of services. At the same time the work of Ayrshire Woodlands at Whitehill Colliery and Auchlin has transformed derelict industrial sites into wildlife sanctuaries and pleasant walking areas.

Paths and access

There are a number of rights of way and designated core paths around Ochiltree but less so around Skares. Walking is a popular activity with some routes such as the High Road, the Poole Pad and the River Lugar Walk being well used. There is much support for the improvement of local paths and in particular the development of routes to Dumfries House, Auchinleck House and the River Ayr. In addition the proposals for the North Kyle Forest offer great opportunities for new links and access points particularly at Skares.

Wildlife

The wildlife of the area, which has shown great resilience to change, is showing signs of benefiting from a more enlightened approach. Controls on water pollution and a willingness to incorporate environmental assessments into planning proposals have had an impact. Having said this it is important that future planning proposals and changes to land use are rigorously inspected, to ensure that the area maintains a suitable high quality environment to support the plants, animals and insects that characterise our countryside.

Sites of Special Significance

The preservation and protection of historical, wildlife and cultural sites is vital as part of our heritage. It is accepted that times move on, but where possible, the past should be both remembered and if possible preserved for future generations to learn from and enjoy. A number of archaeological remains, which include Pedens Cave, Ochiltree Mill, Mote Toll area, and The Camp (Mill Road) are listed as archaeologically important. Some of the houses have been given conservation status, including The House with the Green Shutters (the birthplace of George Douglas Brown, author of the book by the same name). The raised bog at Barlosh Moss has been given Site of Special Scientific Importance (SSSI) status, and the woodlands of the Lugar Water at Auchinleck Estate are also listed as important. Nearby, Whitehill Colliery and Auchin are nature reserves maintained by Ayrshire Woodlands.

Other Environmental Issues

There is particular concern in the village relating to heavy traffic. Noise, vibration damage, air pollution and the potential for serious accident's are all associated factors.

Issues relating to agricultural runoff and offensive smells caused by the spreading of agricultural waste have been raised.

Concern has been expressed about air quality as a result of discharges from the Egger Factory at Barony, methane discharges from Garlaff Coup, and potential problems with the proposed development at Killoch.








Some of the gravestones in the old cemetery date from the 1700s.









Likes and Dislikes

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Our Community Our History



Killoch colliery started production in 1960 and in 1965 was the first Scottish pit to produce 1 million tons of coal in a year. It was a huge employer in the area and ceased production in November 1986.

Ochiltree in the Middle Ages was spelled Uchletree. It is near Auchinleck and Cumnock. Ochiltree is one of the oldest villages in East Ayrshire, with remains dating from the Stone Age.

The House with the Green Shutters on Ochiltree's Main Street is the house where George Douglas Brown was born on 26th January 1869. He went to school at Ochiltree, Coylton and Ayr. He wrote the novel 'The House with the Green Shutters', which is about Scottish life and character: The village 'Barbie' in the book is believed to be Ochiltree.

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Our Community Our History

By the early 1900's, Skares had its fair share of social, educational and sports activities. Skares Memorial Hall opened in 1922 to commemorate the 14 Skares men who gave their lives in WW1. The hall had reading and games rooms with seating for 200, where wedding receptions and concerts were held and where various social groups and public meetings met. These included the Free Gardeners, Rechabites, Juvenile Football Club, Brass Band, Dramatic Club. Quoiting Club, Phonetic Class, Good Templars and an Ambulance Corps. Various football teams were also formed: Skares Victoria, Skares Athletic, Skares United. Skares Brunton Lads and of course the famous Skares Bluebells.


Primary school children attended nearby Garrallan School but due to increasing demand a new brick built school was built in Skares capable of holding 200 pupils with children over 12 attending the nearby Cumnock School. Around 1904 the Parish School Board purchased a new piano for the school as the old one had been gnawed by rats! Facilities for further education were offered in the continuation classes to young people age 15-18, where discussion groups, country and modern dancing and youth service classes were all well attended. Skares Primary continued as a one-teacher school until 1966 having only 7 pupils, when it closed.

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Our Community Our History



In 1666 the Covenanters gathered at Ochiltree.

Four parties of Covenanters gathered from South West Scotland, mustered and rested at Ochiltree, led by Colonel James Wallace. They then passed through Cumnock and Lanark, heading for the fateful battle at Rullion Green 28th November 1666.

John Knox the great reformer married Ochiltree's daughter Margaret Stewart.

Our Community Our History

How a Sheeps head destroyed Ochiltree Castle

On the banks of the river Lugar before Wallaces cave are the Remains of Auchinteck constru on one side and very few remains of Denilbree coastle on the other side.

In the 15th century the family called Auchinleck lived in the Auchinleck castle and the Colvill formily lived in Ochultree castle.

They had a rope going from one castle to the other across the river Lugar, which they used to send messages and other things to each other.

the Laird Auchinteck Sent over a sheeps head in a parcel over the rope to the Ochillree castle.

The Colvillo at Ochulorec castle were furious and attacked Auchinleck castle and slayed Lairol Auchinleck.


Laird Auchinteck was a Relative of the Black Douglas, a powerful warrior from Lanarkshine, and when he heard what had happend, he came swiftly to Ochutree castle and burned it to the ground, and killed the heard of the Colvill family.

Main Themes & Priorities

These are the main strategies and priorities identified by the local communities through surveys, profiles and interviews, which were further prioritised at the Community Event

Community Facilities & Services

There was a very strong belief that a new Community Hub / Centre for the Village of Ochiltree was really important to continue engaging with the whole community and to attract new and existing groups to the area with a warm safe environment for them to meet and socialise.

The community feel very passionate about improving education facilities and ensuring that every child has a great start in life through their local Primary School.

Other services that the community identified were investment in good quality social housing and the upgrade of existing ones, to allow more affordable accommodation to attract new people to the area.

Building Local Economy & Tourism

The area of Ochiltree and Skares is predominately agricultural, however there is a strong feeling that more shops and businesses would allow more opportunities for the area and attract more tourists.

There is a belief that promoting the tourist attractions / information within the areas e.g. Wallace's Cave, The Green Shutters, Ochiltree Castle, Auchinleck House, Pedens Cave, The Miners and Dumfries House would attract more people to the area helping with the economy and raising the profile.

Community Spirit / Activities & Events

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More activities and events were highlighted within the priorities and people want to see more social events for both elderly and young people. Surveys suggested that they would like to see the Gala Day coming back, more after school activities and youth clubs.

There is a great sense of community pride and spirit within the areas, however people would like to see more volunteers coming along to help with the local groups and activities. There is also a need to ensure that all activities are promoted and accessible to everyone.

Improved Roads Transport & Paths

Improving Public Transport was highlighted in the priorities and people feel that there is limited access to main services for the rural areas, the bus service in the rural areas could be improved. Throughout both areas the community feel that pathways and walkways need to be upgraded with people voting on a path from Auchinleck House to Barony A Frame to Dumfries House to Ochiltree. Skares would like to see the woodland walk upgraded too.

The Kay Park is also an area that could be developed to ensure that it is used to its full potential.

People feel that the roads could be improved and traffic calming measures investigated.

Village Appearance & Open Spaces

While both areas have beautiful countryside around them, there is a feeling that there is still a lot that could be improved, as Skares would like to see the Opencast behind the village restored to its natural habitat. Ochiltree would like to see improved signs at the entrances to the village as they have deteriorated over the years.

There is an issue with dog mess and litter and people get very frustrated by people just not respecting the area and cleaning up after their pets.

Community Café

Operates twice a week in the Ochiltree Community Hub Office (top shop) – Tuesday afternoon and Saturday morning.

Ochiltree Community Hub Office

When the Community Centre and library closed in March 2016 the group felt it was important to have a base and they applied to Comic Relief for funding, who granted them money to run the office and open it to other community groups. The Hub base keeps focus in the village.

Theme: Building Local Economy & Tourism



Agriculture and mining were for years the bedrock of the local economy. Pre 1940's small cottage industries were common in our community but in more modern times these have died out. Today the internet offers opportunities for home business but there is limited opportunity for them to feed into the local economy. Services such as the shop, takeaway, garage and public house are well used and provide some employment.

There is an identified need for tourist related services, particularly accommodation as such developments would attract more visitors and provide a need for support services. Identifying, developing and promoting more tourist related opportunities is vital for the future economy of the community. Government support for the agricultural sector post Brexit is of major importance to our rural community.



When the Ochiltree and Skares area was part of a thriving Ayrshire mining community, the culture of 'work hard, play hard' supported a vibrant public entertainment venue at the British Legion in Ochiltree. It was a place not just for fun and entertainment but also a meeting place where folk would catch up with local 'gossip' and information. Equally the Bowling Green enjoyed strong patronage and provided recreation and inter community connections. Gala days, farm shows, school and church related events all added to the mix.

Following the demise of the deep mines and more recently the increase in popularity of home based entertainment the demand for community events and activities has changed. The closure of the British Legion and the reduction in public houses did not result in the increased use of the community centre and a general decline in attendance at the Bowling Green made its future insecure. This was a period of dramatic change and economic uncertainty. An era came to an end, a new generation was emerging.

Since that time things have moved on and with new housing, new residents and a fresh approach to community cohesion we have seen Gala days and recent special music and entertainment events well attended. The Bowling Green has survived and has received new investment. Above all the enthusiasm for the replacement of the old Community Centre (now demolished) is an example of the overwhelming will to bring back the community spirit of the past and to develop new ideas for the future.



A map of the area clearly shows that Ochiltree and Skares are well connected by road to other parts of Ayrshire and beyond. Currently there is a reasonable bus service and both rail and airport services can be accessed without too much difficulty.

The A70 as a major artery does however cause some problems for Ochiltree and for many years a bypass has been discussed but, realistically it is an unlikely development.

Ochiltree and Skares are ideally placed to be at the centre of a public path and cycleway network and existing rights of way could easily be expanded to take advantage of nearby tourist developments.






SKARES RAILWAY STATION

The station opened on 1 July 1872, and closed on 10 September 1951 and was situated towards the north of the village.





Theme: Village Appearance & Open Spaces



Both Skares and Ochiltree still retain architectural character that reflects their past: Ochiltree in particular has benefited from a conservation order protecting many of its oldest properties. There is a considerable amount of historical importance in both settlements and the surrounding area as well as a very pleasant landscape and amenable environment.

To enhance the communities action to combat despoliation by mining, fly tipping and proliferation of utility poles is ongoing and partnerships with agencies to conserve the landscape are being supported. Hands-on activities by the community such as litter picks and the monitoring of dog fouling are examples of the strength and depth of concern and interest.


