# INTRODUCTION

## **PATNA COMMUNITY ACTION PLAN STEERING GROUP**

The preparation of the Action Plan has been guided by a local steering group which brought together representatives from Patna Community Council, Patna Primary School PTA, Patna Primary School Parent Council, Patna Primary School, St Xavier's Primary School, St Xavier's Primary PTA, Patna Community Association, Patna Waterside Parish Church, Patna Youth Group, LLOL 139, LOL 47 and Patna Fishing Club, local businesses and interested members of the community.

## **LOCAL PEOPLE HAVE THEIR SAY**

The Action Plan has been informed by extensive community engagement carried out over a six month period from May 2014 - October 2014.

The process involved:

- a community views survey, which was delivered to all households;
- stakeholder interviews with different groups and individuals representing all aspects and ages of the community;
- young people's survey, conducted through Patna Primary School, St Xavier's Primary School and Doon Academy;
- preparing a community profile detailing facts and figures about the community;
- a Community Event.

# OUR COMMUNITY NOW FACTS & FIGURES

We have summarised below some of the main facts and figures from the Community Profile - a report produced by the Steering Group to give a picture of Patna now.

## LOCATION

Patna and Polnessan are located in the Doon Valley beside the River Doon and on the A713, approximately 7 miles from Ayr. It is near the villages of Waterside, Dalmellington and Kirkmichael, and close to the Dark Sky Observatory at Craigengillan and a 13th century castle at Loch Doon.



## POPULATION

The population of Patna in 2010 was just over 2,200 – there has been an increase of around 1% in the last 10 years.

There is a larger percentage of pre-school children than the national average and at the other end there is a significantly smaller percentage of 16–29 year olds.

The number of over 60's is higher than the rest of East Ayrshire and the national average, this might be due to the fact that there are two nursing homes in the village. This could also account for the higher than average percentage of part time work and the higher percentage of people with poor health.

The gender split in Patna is consistent with the figures reported across East Ayrshire and Scotland as a whole.

## EMPLOYMENT & LOCAL ECONOMY

Mining was the mainstay of the local economy until the 1980s when pit closures had a devastating effect on local employment and the economy. The recent decline in the opencast mining industry has further compounded unemployment in the local area. Unemployment rates in the area are slightly higher than the average for East Ayrshire.

Just over 57% of Patna's population are currently in employment, with the majority of those being employed in the health and social care sector. The main local employers in the area are two care homes. Local businesses include a variety of shops, taxi companies and other businesses such as a specialist cake business and construction related contractors.

## HOUSING

Patna reports a lower level of owner occupied housing than the East Ayrshire and Scotland average. As a result, the area reports a higher level of local authority renting.

As at September 2014, the Council had a stock of 319 properties in Patna, with 57 people on the waiting list for a Council house. 15 houses are currently vacant, 14 of these are in Doon-bank.

### PARKS AND PLAY AREAS

There are two parks within Patna, one is situated at Doonbank and one off Carnshalloch Avenue.

### HEALTH AND CARE FACILITIES

Patna Resource Centre, built in 2012 replaced the old Doctors' Surgery in Patna. The resource centre now houses the following services/staff.

- Community Staff / Auxiliary staff
- GP's/District Nurses/Practice Nurses
- Health Visitors
- Podiatrist
- Community Psychiatric Nurses (CPNs)
- Addictions Team
- Chaplaincy Service
- Dietician

There are 5 partners based within the practice, with over 4,500 people registered. The practice also serves the communities of Rankinston, Coylton and Dalrymple.

There is also a Boots pharmacy located within Patna Resource Centre.

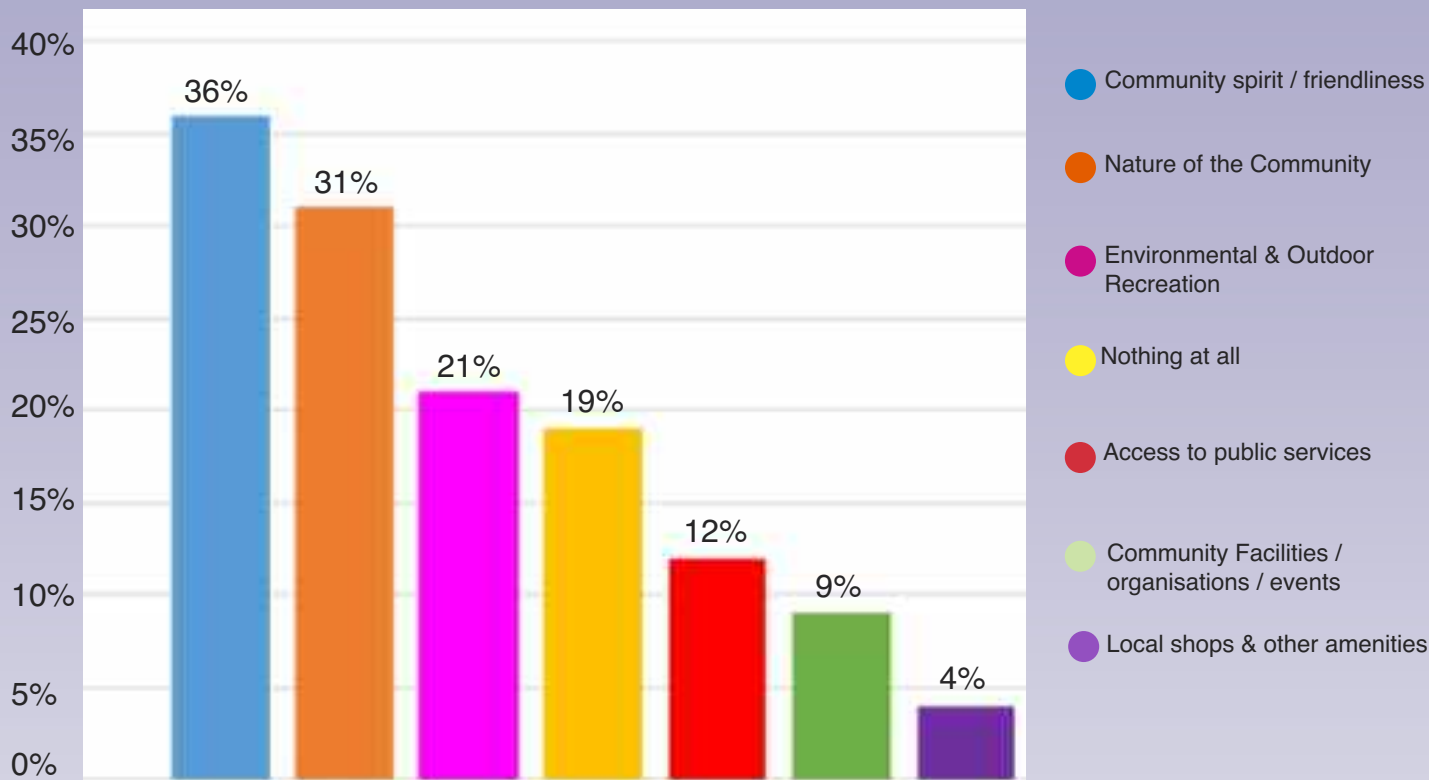
The nearest hospital is Ayr Hospital which is approximately 7 miles away. This also includes an Accident and Emergency Service.

## What People Said.....

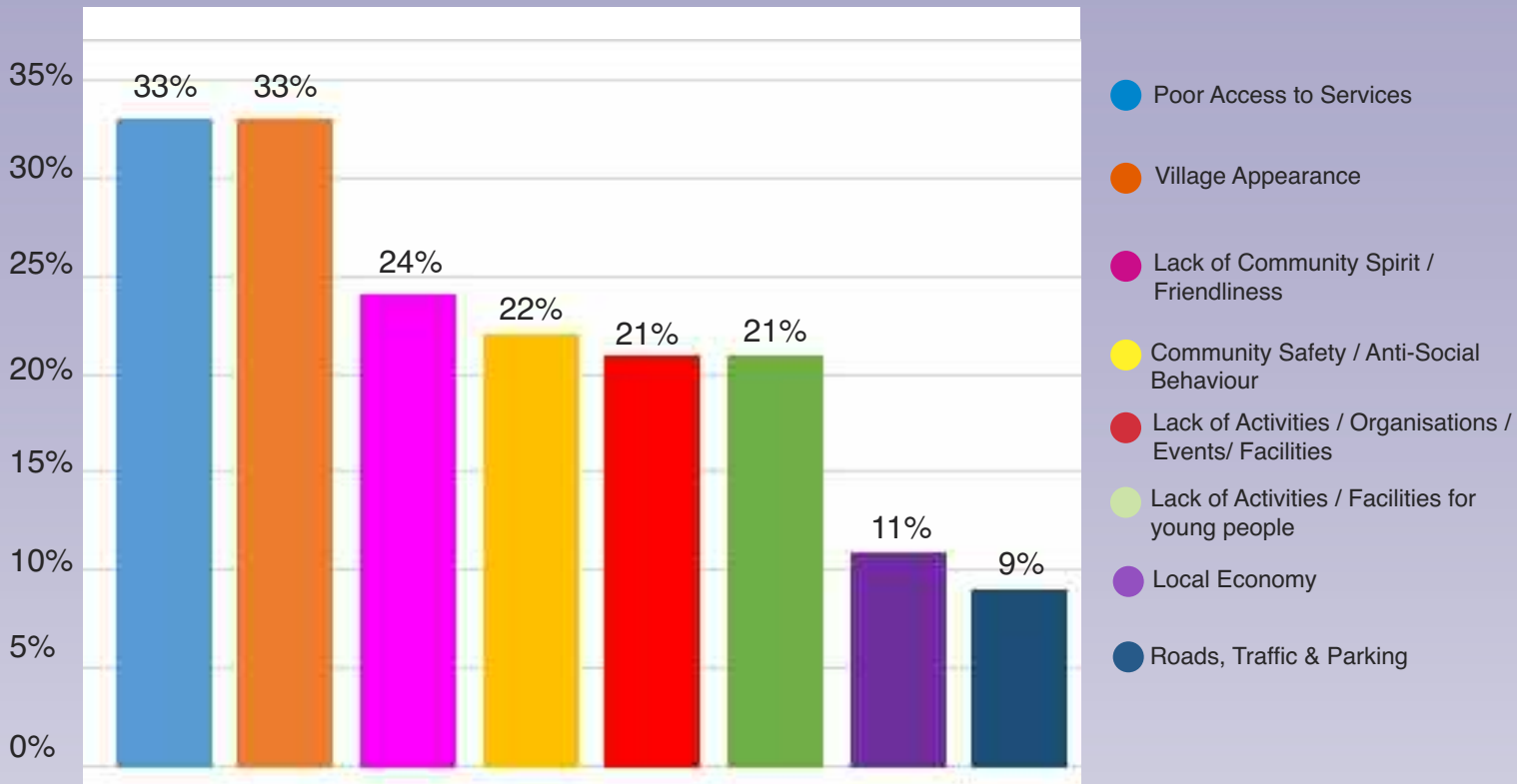
- 'It's a strong family community where everyone pulls together in hour of need'*

## What People Said.....

- 'The uncertainty of keeping community facilities open'*
- 'The police don't show up very often and they don't patrol the area hardly'*
- 'I do not like the fact that a community spirit is absent in Patna, lets pull together and we will have a village to be proud of'*
- 'High levels of alcohol and drug abuse'*
- 'Lack of facilities for the youngsters as they congregate around the shops at night which is intimidating'*
- 'Lack of safe, fun play areas for all ages'*
- 'The lack of a community hub where people can meet for tea/coffee/cakes and a chat'*
- 'One cashpoint and always broken'*
- 'The lack of prospect and activities for young people are a worry and can lead to anti-social behaviour'*
- 'Speeding cars'*
- 'The mess left by the Opencast. This has cost Patna its heritage, walks and cycling areas'*
- 'Nothing to attract tourism to the area, nowhere to go for a meal, hotel etc'*
- 'There are not a lot of employment opportunities in the village'*

# OUR VISION FOR THE FUTURE PATNA 2020

This statement has been prepared to summarise the main aspirations for the future as expressed by local people and organisations in their replies to the survey and stakeholder interviews.

## A CLOSER COMMUNITY WITH A STRONG PRIDE IN OUR VILLAGE

- To be an upbeat and happy place for the future generations of the village. A place to be proud to say you live in.
- A thriving community where we all have a sense of belonging.
- A place where everyone takes pride in their village.



## A VILLAGE THAT IS CLEAN, ATTRACTIVE AND SAFE

- Friendly, peaceful and no one is afraid to go near the shops after 7pm.
- For people to be proud of their houses and gardens.
- A clean, tidy, pleasant and happy place to live, with things to do for families with children.



## WITH GOOD COMMUNITY FACILITIES, EVENTS AND ACTIVITIES

- To be more of a community with days planned through the year to bring us together.
- A busy vibrant community with lots to do regardless of age, gender or disability.
- A community that has plenty of opportunities for people to learn new skills.

## TO HAVE A STRONG & HEALTHY LOCAL ECONOMY

- To have Main Street redevelopment for new businesses.
- To be a village that attracts tourists, to have more cafes, public toilets and more things to do.



## TO BE RECOGNISED FOR ITS HERITAGE, ENVIRONMENT & OUTDOOR RECREATION

- A place people will want to visit with its well promoted networks of paths and walks.
- To create new paths and cycle trails to entice tourists.



# MAIN STRATEGIES AND PRIORITIES

These are the main strategies and priorities identified by the local community through profiles, surveys and interviews, which were further prioritised at the Community Event.

## COMMUNITY FACILITIES, EVENTS AND ACTIVITIES

The village has always had a strong sense of community but has seen a decrease in the number of events and activities in recent years. The consultation process highlighted a desire for this to improve and to see the return of events such as gala days, the raft race and the development of community based projects.

Younger members of our community want to see an improvement in the facilities available such as improved play areas and the introduction of new facilities, with a skate park and AstroTurf pitch being the main desired attractions.

In addition, the community would like to retain current facilities such as the Games Hall and the Day Centre and improve awareness and use of these.

### Main priorities:

- Retain and improve community facilities, e.g. The Games Hall, Day Centre.
- Improve facilities for young people.
- Increase community events and projects e.g. Gala Week and a Community Garden.
- Increase in community groups, e.g. sports groups and groups for adults.

## VILLAGE APPEARANCE

Patna is a very scenic village with areas of particular beauty but is blighted in some areas with derelict or run down buildings. Through the consultation process the community highlighted a desire to see the removal and improvement of buildings which detract from the attractiveness of the area, with the shopping area a particular concern.

The amount of litter and dog mess was also highlighted as an area of improvement for residents as well as the introduction of more decorative features in the village:

### Main priorities:

- Increase in decorative features e.g. hanging baskets and planters.
- Reduce litter and dog fouling.
- Improve the appearance of the shops and removal of derelict buildings/ maintenance of derelict land.
- Help residents refresh the appearance of homes and gardens.



# MAIN STRATEGIES AND PRIORITIES



## LOCAL ECONOMY AND SERVICES

There was a strong need identified to support current local businesses and attract more businesses to the area. This was seen as a key factor in developing facilities which would encourage tourism to the area and celebrate our local heritage.

The community also highlighted the need to increase employment and training opportunities as well as facilities to support working families such as an increase in child care facilities.

### Main priorities:

- Attract more businesses e.g. café, restaurant.
- Increase employment and training opportunities e.g. work experience, support local businesses.
- Develop attractions and facilities to increase tourism e.g. public toilets and increase the number of ATM's.
- Increase child care facilities.

## COMMUNITY SAFETY AND ANTI-SOCIAL BEHAVIOUR

While residents like living in the community, the consultation showed a lot of concern around an increase in anti-social behaviour. Members of the community feel intimidated by youths congregating in the village and would like to see an increased police presence and other measures taken to reduce this.

Under-age drinking, drug use and vandalism also featured highly during the consultation with many members of the community concerned about the levels of these activities in the village.

### Main priorities:

- Increasing police presence around the village.
- Increase the safety of the shop area e.g. increase lighting, install CCTV.
- Tackle issues of underage drinking, drug use and vandalism.

# MAIN STRATEGIES AND PRIORITIES



## OUTDOOR RECREATION AND ACCESS TO THE COUNTRYSIDE

The community appreciate the existing outdoor recreation activities available such as the Jubilee Walk and the Golf Course and would like to see measures in place to make these more accessible. Specific concerns included lighting on the walk way and the lack of programmes encouraging membership of the Golf Club.

Improving parks featured highly for residents, as did the introduction of cycle routes and extending current walking routes.

### Main priorities:

- Extend walking routes and encourage community involvement in their development.
- Creation of cycle routes around the village.
- Keep the Golf Course open and available.
- Develop outdoor park facilities e.g. play areas, picnic areas.



## TRAFFIC AND PARKING

The speed of vehicles around the village give the community cause for concern, particularly around the school and the main road. Other concerns which featured highly included a lack of maintenance of roads and pavements.

Residents would like to see enhancements made to the current walk way between the shop area and the GP's surgery, making the journey between two important areas of the village both safer and easier.

### Main priorities:

- Increase maintenance of roads and pavements.
- Development of traffic management methods including parking and speed restrictions.
- Improve path network from shops to GP surgery.
