The following Learning Studies are compiled by the *Community Led Regeneration Team* (CLRT) through our continued work with successful Place-Based Investment Programme (PBIP) partners. These projects offer a snap shot of the journey which CLRT, wider East Ayrshire Council colleagues, and organisations have undertaken.

#### **Place-Based Investment Programme**

The Place-Based Investment Programme is a Scottish Government initiative designed to revitalise communities across Scotland. It aims to support town centre revitalisation and community led regeneration by ensuring that all place based investments are shaped by the needs and aspirations of local communities. It also seeks to tackle inequality and disadvantage and accelerate local ambitions for net zero, wellbeing, community involvement and ownership.

#### **CLRT Learning Studies**

These learning studies aim to identify and understand the key factors contributing to successful implementation and outcomes. By working with our partners to consider a 360 learning journey both East Ayrshire Council and our partners can gain valuable insights into best practices, challenges and opportunities.

# Ayrshire Food Hub **Learning Study**

#### **Organisation Summary**

Nestled in the rural outskirts of Hurlford, Kilmarnock, lies the Ayrshire Food Hub, a bustling centre comprising a café, development kitchen, meeting room, growing garden and a farm shop. On the site of the former Crossroads Primary School the hub services 6 rural parishes and hamlets distributing 'Fairshare', produce from local Supermarkets to alleviate local food insecurtiy and uses produce destined for Landfill.

#### **Project Summary**

Ayrshire Food Hub succesfully applied to to PBIP Funding for 3 projects over a two year period these were:

"Best Health for All": The premise of the project was two fold:

- To increase the ability of the organisation to provide low cost home cooked meals for a client group particularly impacted by the Cost of Living crisis.
- To provide opportunities for local people to socialise including choirs, food demos and talks through providing a portable stage on site.

"Eco Gardening": Building on its commitment to sustainability and community engagement, the Hub pursued funding for the "Eco gardening" project. With a vision to transform underutilised land surrounding the Hub into a thriving green space, the initiative aimed to expand growing capacity, facilitate the cultivation of herbs and vegetables, and generate additional income through the sale of plants and flowers.

"So Kids Can Play": Responding to the aspirations expressed by people visiting for a safe outdoor play area, the Hub initiated the "So kids can play" project.

Collaborating with the local community and stakeholders, including two former Crossroads Primary teachers, Crossroads Young Farmers, two regular visiting children and a representative from the parents/babies and toddlers group, the project aimed to design and construct a designated play area. After choosing the best options from supplied quotes, the community were asked to vote on their favourite designs.

#### **Funding**

Totality of Funding for all three projects are as follows:

Place Based Investment Programme (PBIP) - £43,035 Other internal/External Funding - £15,800







- 1. Community feedback drove the project's priorities.
- Collaboration with East Ayrshire Council helped overcome challenges in the funding application.
- Local investment supported both project success and the local economy.

## Bonnyton Community Centre **Learning Study**

#### **Organisation Summary**

Bonnyton Community Centre, managed by the Bonnyton Community Association, is a vital resource in East Ayrshire, providing a range of social, cultural, and health-related services. Transitioning into a charity has enabled the centre to secure funding, supporting its mission to improve the quality of life for Kilmarnock residents. As well as events they also use the venue to host specialised groups like stroke recovery sessions and music movement classes for the elderly.

#### **Project Summary**

The need to renovate the kitchen became a top priority for the association following a survey of local people who benefit from use of the centre. The kitchen, unchanged since the late 1990s, was in a state of disrepair and no longer met the needs of the centre's users. Community members expressed that an upgraded kitchen would be highly beneficial, particularly in promoting healthy eating and cooking skills among both children and parents.

Recognising the importance of this project, the Association, with the assistance of a Community Worker from East Ayrshire Council, applied for £54,571.70 from the Place Based Investment Programme. Their vision for the new kitchen included offering breakfast and after-school clubs to support families in need, particularly during school holidays. Additionally, the new kitchen would facilitate cooking and food budgeting classes aimed at tackling food poverty, helping families improve their health and well-being, and fostering stronger family connections.

Given the centre's busy schedule, the new kitchen would also enable more efficient catering for events, bolstering the centre's income generation efforts. The renovation work was completed by a local joiner who had previously worked with the centre, aligning with the Association's commitment to keeping investments local and contributing to the Community Wealth Building agenda.

#### **Funding**

Totality of Funding for the project as follows:

• Place Based Investment Programme (PBIP) - £54,571.70

#### Conclusion

The kitchen renovation at Bonnyton Community Centre highlights the power of community input in shaping projects that meet local needs. The upgraded facilities now support essential services, including healthy eating programs and event catering, fostering stronger community ties and improving the wellbeing of families. The project not only improves the centre's functionality but also enhances its role as a lifeline for the residents of Kilmarnock.







- 1. The project, was linked to a wider strategy which meant that when they were ready to apply for Screen Scotland to set up a new Skills Incubator, they had a greater chance of success, having already secured the capital equipment required.
- Supply issues prevented the prompt delivery and installation of the equipment, this was a potential risk to timelines.

# Centrestage Flicks Learning Study

#### **Organisation Summary**

Centrestage is a community-based organisation, occupying the former Kilmarnock Academy building. Their vision is "To create a community where everyone can experience the joy of music, arts and wellbeing, and seamlessly access all they need to flourish in life." Centrestage focuses on inclusivity, accessibility, and personal development through cultural and artistic activities that promote health, wellbeing, and social interaction.

#### **Project Summary**

Centrestage Flicks is a community cinema initiative designed to provide a relaxed, multicultural film experience aimed at fostering relationships, reducing loneliness, and supporting personal development. Funded through a £10,000 PBIP award, it contributed to purchasing technical equipment for the cinema's 280-seat auditorium. The project aligns with Centrestage's strategy of building community and friendships, offering films for diverse, neurodiverse audiences at low/no cost. Subsequent funding from Screen Scotland (£20,000) and match funding from a private benefactor has further supported the development, allowing Centrestage to pursue broader goals, including skills development for people seeking a career in the local film and TV industry. The project will make a significant impact by offering entertainment while supporting opportunities and reducing social isolation.

In the first and second year of the place-based investment programme, Centrestage received awards of 200K and 50K respectively to:

- Upgrade kitchen and room in the Neighbourhood section of the site.
- Upgrade, modernise, and decorate one of the large rooms in the historic section (on the 1st floor).

#### **Funding**

Totality of Funding for the project as follows:

- Place Based Investment Programme (PBIP) £10,000
- External Funding £40,000

#### Conclusion

Centrestage have used PBIP investment to deliver on their wider strategy of helping people to fulfil their full potential for themselves and in the community while also ensuring that the additional transformations contributed to the viability of their business model. In the final year of investment, match funding contributed significantly to the provision of the cinema equipment and ultimately to the ongoing use of the cinema via a new partnership with Screen Scotland. The project has opened doors for skills development in the local film and TV industry, creating a lasting impact on both individual wellbeing and the broader community.







- Consider the organisational capacity and the availability of skills required at the early stages of commencing a project to avoid delays.
- Community groups, and those engaged in regeneration activity should be mindful that the activity can be a long-term time and energy investment.

## Cumnock Memory Garden **Learning Study**

#### **Organisation Summary**

The Cumnock Action Plan Group, to advance the priorities within their action plan (2016-2021) commissioned the Green Action Trust, the organisation who "offer help to deliver and create greenspace, manage woodlands, and unlock the potential of land assets to meet net zero, biodiversity, and ESG targets" to make their Memory Garden at a bit of land adjacent to Armitage drive in Cumnock.

Previously they, CAP and GAT, delivered the Pocket Park at Tower Street, Cumnock, which was also part funded by the PBIP.

#### **Project Summary**

Cumnock Action Plan identified the need for a dementia-friendly space, given Cumnock's ageing population with more than 25% over 60 years old. It is estimated that dementia affects one in 14 people over 65 and one in six over 80 in the UK.

While there are a small number of organisations in Cumnock that cater for the elderly, most of these are based indoors. Cumnock Action Plan decided to lease the site from the council to take forward their idea for a welcoming and accessible outdoor space. Together they have created a space where activities can be delivered safely outside in a natural environment, providing benefits to quality of life and mental and physical health and well-being.

In phase 2, a zone was created with a central pergola and raised planters. Sensory colourful planting and wildflower meadows provide sensory cues as tools for reminiscence, creating a familiar, relaxing and safe space. It also creates a colourful and interesting space for the local community and provides habitat and forage for pollinators and other wildlife.

Coloured benches have been installed, which provide space to rest and connect with nature and also support navigation of the site by those with dementia.

#### **Funding**

Totality of Funding for the project as follows:

- Place Based Investment Programme (PBIP) £33,000
- External Funding £92,804

#### Conclusion

The Memory garden aims to deliver a range of environmental and social benefits. In addition to the tree and bulb planting, the wildflower meadow provides foraging and habitat for pollinators. The dementia-friendly space means activities can be delivered safely outside, bringing benefits to the quality of life of Cumnock's ageing population. while the space has also been enhanced with sculptures, colourful seating and sensory planting and is accessed via paths suited to those with impaired mobility.

- 1. Securing competent contractors do perform the overall work package and also secure the best value for money was a challenge and added a great deal of time to the project timeline
- Collaboration with key council departments was key to enriching the overall project- in this case Greener Communities.
- Community Engagement and partnerships were stregthened through collaborative, hands on activites.

#### **Impact Quotes**

- As well as the following outputs:
- 1.4 ha of habitat restoration carried out
- 380 trees planted
- 0.24ha of grassland habitat created
- 3 x new wildlife ponds created
- 435m of new path constructed
- 100 m of edible hedgerow created
- 1 x new community greenspace created
- 1 x new outdoor classroom created

#### Conclusion

The project received national recognition at the Love Local Awards in 2023 where, in a strong field (no pun intended), featuring a community garden project in Ibrox, Dalrymple walked home with the Climate and Net Zero town of the year award.

DaSH received local recognition and media attention in the Cumnock Chronicle where updates on the project's progress was featured regularly.

The space continues to be used by the Local Primary School and the wider community.

# Dalrymple Wetland Reserve Learning Study

#### **Organisation Summary**

Dalrymple, Skeldon and Hollybush (DaSH) Project, is a grassroots organisation dedicated to enhancing the lives of Dalrymple residents. Through various projects and events, they aim to build a stronger more connected community. Their initiatives focus on creating inclusive spaces, supporting local talent, and fostering a sense of belonging for everyone. They believe in the power of collaboration and are committed to making Dalrymple a vibrant and welcoming place for all.

#### **Project Summary**

The wetland reserve project was delivered via a partnership between DaSH Project and Green Action Trust.

Recognising that <u>97% of Britain's flower rich meadows have been lost</u> an important part of the project has in a small but significant way started to address this loss with an improvement in biodiversity.

The need for this project was identified via the community led action plan (19-24) which East Ayrshire Council's Vibrant Communities worked closely with the village on.

DaSH, Green Action Trust, The local Primary School, Froglife, The Nature Restoration Fund, and East Ayrshire Council have all worked collaboratively to bring this project to life.

The aim was to create a 1.4 hectare wetland reserve in fields on the edge of the village of Dalrymple, creating a mosaic of wetland habitats including woodland, meadow and ponds to improve and diversify the range of habitats found locally.

The reserve is directly accessible to residents from the north of the village (where Dalrymple Primary School is located).

The enclosed space with a surfaced path and seating, will offer local, safe, off-road routes for exercise and connection with nature.

Ultimately, this initiative has beautified a sizeable area in the village and created a new activity for the community to enjoy and use.

#### **Funding**

Funding for the project is broken down as follows:

PBIP: £20,000 External: £80,000

In summary for every £1 invested via PBIP an additional £4 was leveraged for the benefit of the project and community.

# DART - The Corner **Learning Study**

#### **Organisation Summary**

DART (Darvel Area Regeneration Team) is a community-focused organisation dedicated to enhancing local public spaces in Darvel. Their mission involves addressing community concerns through collaborative projects, improving safety and inclusivity in public areas, and fostering a stronger sense of civic pride and engagement.

#### **Project Summary**

The Corner is a multi-purpose community space located in the centre of Darvel at the location of the old co-op building. This site was a sensitive issue for residents as the once bustling cooperative building was now an eyesore. The demolition of the buildings and the redevelopment of the site was identified in the first Community Action Plan. At first, the Darvel and District Community Council (DDCC) tasked themselves with addressing this issue. Originally intending to install a car park following demolition of the derelict building. However, plans changed, and the DDCC decided that a community market space would be a better use of the space. It was proposed that a separate charitable organisation be formed to oversee this new exciting project development as wider funding opportunities would be more accessible.

The watch word for The Corner is versatility. It has been designed to be a go-to location for events in the town throughout the day and evening. In addition to the monthly markets which have become firmly established, these events range from being a social centre for people to catch-up with friends and family to an outdoor centre at the core of many local cycling and walking routes. Furthermore, it has been designed to be a space for a variety of additional events such as exhibitions, music and community events.

#### **Funding**


Totality of Funding for the project as follows:

- Place Based Investment Programme (PBIP) £120,000
- Town Centre Regeneration £250,000
- External Funding £219,000

#### Conclusion

DART'S perseverance and determination to succeed is a shining example of what can be achieved in the face of adversity. By working with other community groups in the area, doing continuous consultation and welcoming volunteers, DART have created a resource for use by the whole community for decades to come.







- 1. Managing Multiple Funders by coordinating timelines with various funding sources, especially in securing match funding.
- Creating an accessible, open setting provides an alternative to traditional clinical spaces, fostering social connections vital to mental health recovery.
- Offering unique spaces for both mental and physical health, distinguishes it from other facilities in the region.

#### **Impact**

The new counselling space increases KSRHT's capacity, allowing an additional 960 hours of mental health support annually, potentially generating £43,200.





## Kilmarnock Station Railway Heritage Trust **Learning Study**

#### **Organisation Summary**

The Kilmarnock Station Railway Heritage Trust (KSRHT) has been a charity since 2014, led by trustees Allan Brown and Laura Yetton. Its mission focuses on preserving the historical significance of Kilmarnock Railway Station while supporting community development, especially for individuals facing mental health challenges. KSRHT accepts referrals from local authorities. They partners with various organisations to offer unique services that benefit the wider community.

#### **Project Summary**

KSRHT undertook a renovation project to transform unused spaces at Kilmarnock Railway Station into functional areas for community use, including a gym and a counselling room. These new facilities serve a dual purpose: preserving a historical landmark and providing essential services that support mental and physical health.

- Gym Room Renovation: Included repairs to the floor, new heating systems, additional power sockets, and other upgrades to make the space suitable for exercise.
- Underpass Room (Counselling) Renovation: Involved structural repairs, power installation, lighting upgrades, and enhancements to heating and ventilation, creating a private, comfortable environment for counselling sessions.

#### **Funding**

Totality of Funding for the project as follows:

**Underpass Room** 

- PBIP: £10,000
- External Funding: £30,000

#### Gym

- PBIP: £14,400
- External Funding: £32,979

#### Conclusion

KSRHT's commitment to both preserving heritage and addressing community needs, particularly around mental health, has made a lasting impact on Kilmarnock. Despite challenges in project management and funding, their renovated spaces now offer vital services that enhance the well-being of individuals and the town's heritage. KSRHT's work exemplifies the power of community-driven projects to generate social, economic, and cultural value.

#### Conclusion

The renovation of the KULOC building signifies more than just a physical transformation; it symbolises the resilience and unity of the Kilmarnock Chinese community. Despite significant challenges, including those posed by the COVID-19 pandemic, the community's determination and the critical support from East Ayrshire Council have culminated in the successful refurbishment of their cultural and social hub.

The rejuvenated KULOC centre now stands as a beacon of cultural sharing and communal engagement, offering a safe space for socialisation, exercise, and cultural expression. This achievement marks the beginning of a promising and mutually beneficial relationship between KULOC and East Ayrshire Council, fostering a vibrant future for cultural exchange and community cohesion in Kilmarnock and beyond.



# KULOC **Learning Study**

#### **Organisation Summary**

The Kilmarnock Chinese Community Association (KULOC) is a charity, which provides a social and cultural space for the Chinese community in Kilmarnock. KULOC is a direct translation from Cantonese - "KU" is translated as people from Hong Kong and "LOC" means joy and/or happiness.

In the past, KULOC was involved in many events and activities such as the Dragon Dance and celebrations around Chinese New Year. In the KULOC building, activities such as language and Wing-Chun Kung Fu classes were provided for members. When they reopen, KULOC will initially prioritise the elderly members of their community as they are the most likely to be affected by language barriers as well as limited social spaces.

#### **Project Summary**

KULOC identified the need to have a social space for the Chinese community in Kilmarnock to allow older people a chance to socialise and take part in activities with each other. This was identified as a key factor in improving the mental health of the elderly Chinese community in Kilmarnock as the isolation can have a severe impact on someone, especially when they are not confident in their English speaking skills. Now that the centre is open, health information events will be hosted for the community as well as English lessons being provided for those who want to learn useful phrases. Through these actions, KULOC is committed to helping the elderly members of the Chinese community through events that address the factors that cause isolation.

The local contractor hired to do the work described the building as "very dangerous" and "a lot worse" than expected with the extent of the damage that rot had caused. With holes in the floor, walls and roof, immediate work was required. The roof was at a point of collapse endangering anyone who entered the building.

Work started in September 2023 and the completed in early 2024. Downstairs had major renovations done with the rotten flooring replaced and the walls freshened up with none of the original brickworks showing. Upstairs, the areas of damp had been worked upon and were no longer an issue, however, due to some lingering stains some remover was to be used to get rid of them. Throughout the building, it was clear that the lighter colours of paint create a much more open space, giving the feel that the building is larger than it is.

#### **Funding**

Totality of Funding for the project as follows:

- Place Based Investment Programme (PBIP) £58,786
- External Funding £73,392







- 1. Club's committee and volunteers in securing external funding & driving improvements.
- Importance of Local Support to a project, for example the landowner allowing scaffolding on property.
- 3. Adaptability in Challenges is important, as when the original contractors became unavailable, sourced alternative contractor.
- 4. Long-Term Vision for the club with the installation of solar panels.
- Social and Physical Wellbeing taken into consideration through the introduction of "Pensioners Tournament".



#### Conclusion

The successful roof replacement at Lugar Bowling Club is a testament to the power of community engagement, strategic planning, and persistence. Without the PBIP funding, the club's future would have been uncertain. The roof repair not only preserved a critical community space but also enabled the club to expand its activities and continue promoting health, wellbeing, and social connection across all age groups.

As the club looks ahead to further improvements, including solar panel installation and facility upgrades, it remains committed to its mission of fostering community spirit and providing a safe and welcoming space for all.



# Lugar Bowling Club **Learning Study**

#### **Organisation Summary**

Lugar Bowling Club serves as a vital space for recreation, connection and celebration. Memberships have increased in the past year, from 84 to 102 members with ages ranging from 14 to 92 years old, and is particularly valuable in promoting physical activity and socialisation for members over 50. More than just a sports venue, the club hosts numerous community events, partnership events. The deterioration of its roof, threatened its continued operations.

#### **Project Summary**

The roof, installed in 1980, had deteriorated to the point of leaking, causing substantial interior damage. The club attempted patchwork repairs, but the outdated design and materials made this impossible. It was clear that a full roof replacement was necessary for the survival of the club. Without addressing the roof issue, there was a serious risk the club would have to close its doors, this work became essential for the club's survival.

In January 2023, a meeting was arranged between the Club Committee Members, the Team Coordinator from Communities and Economy, and the Community Led Regeneration Officer. During this meeting, the importance of securing funds from the Place-Based Investment Programme (PBIP) was discussed. Two local contractors provided quotes, which were included in the club's PBIP funding application in April 2023 for a full roof replacement.

In June 2023, the Club received the good news that their PBIP funding application had been successful, securing £31,220.40 for the roof replacement. This funding was crucial, as the club could not afford the repairs on its own and would have faced closure without it. However, due to the availability issues of the initial contractors, the club hired J Kelso Roofing Services to carry out the work. They spoke to the landowner who had fields at the side and back of the bowling club to secure permission for scaffolding, ensuring the safety and efficiency of the work

By February 2024, the new roof was completed, leaving the clubhouse fully watertight and protected.

## Netherthird Community Centre **Learning Study**

#### **Organisation Summary**

The Netherthird Initiative for Community Empowerment (NICE) is a social enterprise dedicated to enhancing the Netherthird community in Cumnock. Established to manage the Netherthird Community Centre, NICE focuses on addressing social challenges, improving mental health support, and fostering community engagement through a variety of activities and services.

#### **Project Summary**

NICE transformed the Netherthird Community Centre from a site plagued by vandalism and social issues into a vibrant hub for the community. The centre now offers health classes, exercise groups, children's activities, a charity shop, and a food larder, addressing both social isolation and practical needs. A key initiative was the creation of a community garden, which hosts events and provides educational opportunities. The centre's upgrades, funded by the Place Based Investment Programme (PBIP), included a new commercial kitchen and dedicated mental health rooms, crucial for the community's wellbeing. NICE's efforts have significantly reduced anti-social behaviour by engaging young people and fostering intergenerational connections.

NICE's stewardship of the Netherthird Community Centre has revitalised a struggling community asset into a cornerstone of local life. The successful use of PBIP funding has demonstrated how targeted investment can transform community spaces, providing a model for future initiatives.

## Shop Front Improvement Scheme **Learning Study**

#### **Organisation Summary**

The Shop Front Improvement Scheme (SFIS), initiated in 2022, aimed to enhance the aesthetic and economic vitality of local business areas across Easy Ayrshire. Funded by the Place Based Investment Programme and the Scotland Loves Local Fund, the community-led approach allowed local anchor groups to manage the initiative, targeting businesses for improvements. This project not only improved the community but also fostered economic growth and local collaboration.

#### **Project Summary**

The Shop Front Improvement Scheme (SFIS) was launched with £107,000. The scheme stood out for its community-led approach, empowering local anchor groups to make key decisions regarding which businesses should benefit from funding. These groups, deeply embedded within their communities, were responsible for identifying areas of need, setting funding caps, and evaluating applications. Their local knowledge and networks ensured that the targeted improvements created a positive ripple effect on the surrounding areas. In its second round, the SFIS allocated £60,000 each to Kilmarnock and other areas of East Ayrshire. To date 82 businesses have received SFIS funding, with several other live applicants in the pipeline.

The initiative sparked a domino effect, inspiring some businesses that did not apply for funding to enhance their premises. The SFIS resulted in both aesthetic and economic benefits, increasing footfall and supporting job creation, as in the case of AJ Cosmetics, which expanded its team after improving its storefront. Additionally, the scheme led to system changes in the planning process, easing challenges for applicants, with collaboration between the Community Led Regeneration Officer and Planning colleagues improving accessibility.

The scheme's success highlights the importance of empowering communities, providing support systems, and facilitating system improvements to create lasting, positive change.

# DART - Morton Park Learning Study

#### **Organisation Summary**

DART (Darvel Area Regeneration Team) is a community-focused organisation dedicated to enhancing local public spaces in Darvel. Their mission involves addressing community concerns through collaborative projects, improving safety and inclusivity in public areas, and fostering a stronger sense of civic pride and engagement.

#### **Project Summary**

The Morton Park play area redevelopment project was initiated by DART (Darvel Area Regeneration Team) in response to growing concerns about the safety and usability of the existing facilities. Residents in the community expressed their dissatisfaction on social media regarding the deteriorating condition of the park, particularly the large sandpit, which had become a hub for unsanitary activities, including littering. This situation led to a decline in the park's usage, as parents were understandably concerned about their children's safety. To revitalise the space and make it safer and more inclusive, DART embarked on an ambitious project to renovate Morton Park.

The project involved downsizing a hazardous sandpit and replacing outdated play equipment with inclusive alternatives, making the park accessible to children of all abilities. DART also improved the surrounding environment by landscaping overgrown areas and adding new features like walking paths.

Despite various obstacles, DART successfully revitalised Morton Park into a cleaner, safer, and more inviting space for families. The project is part of a broader five-year plan for ongoing improvements.

The redevelopment of Morton Park is a testament to the power of community-led initiatives. The ongoing improvements at Morton Park have not only made the area safer and more inclusive for children but have also revitalised a vital community space, fostering a greater sense of pride and ownership among residents. With a five-year plan in place, DART remains committed to the continued enhancement of Morton Park, ensuring it serves as a cherished asset for the community for years to come.

# Stewarton Hub **Learning Study**

#### **Organisation Summary**

Stewarton Initiatives, a voluntary organisation, has been instrumental in revitalising a space in the centre of town where a former, old and unused public toilet was located.

Stewarton Initiatives was established to deliver projects in the community and has organised events and activities around Stewarton. Comprised of 12 dedicated members from a diverse range of professional backgrounds, including a journalist, local Councillor, solicitor and an architect. Their collaborative approach ensures that all members contribute to each project.

#### **Project Summary**

The Stewarton community led action plan identified the need for a central hub where residents could access information about local events, hold meetings, and receive health and financial support services. When a disused public building came up for sale, the idea for the Stewarton Community Hub began to take shape.

Realising the complexity of the project, Stewarton Initiatives enlisted Don, a local person with experience as a project manager and a background as an architect. Don's technical expertise was crucial, especially since the team lacked specialised knowledge. His role was to oversee the project, liaise with the contractor, and manage the technical aspects, allowing the team to focus on funding and community engagement.

Stewarton Initiatives worked with a local contractor who are based in the town. The team felt that it tied in with the Community Wealth Building agenda and using a local company would incentivise them to create a successful project while hopefully increasing work for them locally.

In April 2024, Stewarton Initiatives launched the Stewarton Community Hub, converting the space where a disused public toilet stood into a dynamic community space.

Faced with challenges including rising material costs and unexpected discoveries like an old oil tank, the team persevered with support from East Ayrshire Council. Despite delays caused by land ownership issues and a water supply problem, the Hub now serves as a versatile facility for various community activities, showcasing the impact of dedicated local effort.

The programme not only helped participants develop practical skills and confidence but also provided them with clear pathways to positive destinations, whether in education or employment.

The project also demonstrated Yipworld's ability to effectively utilise funding, support local businesses, and foster community partnerships. As a result of this success, Yipworld is set to expand its work, continuing to make a significant impact on the lives of young people in Cumnock and beyond.



# Yipworld **Learning Study**

#### **Organisation Summary**

Yipworld supports young people who struggle in traditional school settings by providing practical programmes in areas like gardening, beauty and cooking. This study highlights how targeted interventions, thoughtful use of resources, and strong community ties can create lasting positive change for young people and the wider community and offers alternative pathways to equip these individuals with the necessary skills for their future.

#### **Project Summary**

The Skills Shop Programme was designed to support young people who struggle in conventional school settings by helping them develop practical skills and trades while also building their confidence. Initially targeting S3 and S4 pupils from Robert Burns Academy, the program offered a wide range of activities, including gardening, ground maintenance, horticulture, upcycling furniture, health, well-being & beauty and essential life skills such as money management, cooking, and baking. By offering these opportunities, the Skills Shop contributed to both economic growth and the reduction of social inequalities.

The PBIP funding enabled Yipworld to purchase various tools and equipment, such as domestic lawnmowers, leaf blowers, strimmers, hairdryers, and straighteners, necessary for the hands-on learning experiences provided by the programme.

Throughout the pilot, 13 young people, many from challenging backgrounds, participated in the programme. With the support of Robert Burns Academy's Home Link Worker and Yipworld youth workers, these young people were able to build relationships, gain work experience, and develop life skills such as budgeting and cooking. As a result, all 13 participants either returned to mainstream education or secured positive destinations, including further education at Ayrshire College or enrolment in Yipworld's "Introduction to Careers" course.

# The Well **Learning Study**

#### **Organisation Summary**

The Well, located in Bellfield, south of Kilmarnock, is a community-driven initiative operated by the Church of Scotland. As a central hub for the local population, The Well provides a welcoming environment for diverse social and wellbeing activities. It caters to a wide range of communities, including Bellfield, Shortlees, Riccarton, Caprington and Barnweil, fostering a space where individuals from all backgrounds can come together.

#### **Project Summary**

Recognising a growing local need, The Well sought funding to improve the safety and security of the building and upgrade the outdoor space for use as a café and activity area. The project, driven by local residents, aimed to create a safe communal space to promote community wellbeing and address issues such as social isolation.

The Well is frequently used by various community groups, including pre-school classes, fitness clubs, music groups, and senior citizen associations. It also hosts uniformed organisations and community development initiatives. In the winter months, The Well provided a warm, welcoming space for those in need, solidifying its role as a key resource for the community. While church-based, The Well ensures inclusivity, welcoming individuals of all faiths or none.

Despite its positive impact, The Well faced significant challenges, particularly from antisocial behaviour and vandalism by local youths. These incidents involved youths climbing on the building and causing damage, threatening both the safety and the inclusive nature of the space. In response, The Well implemented several security measures. Anti-climb and anti-vandalism paint was applied to the roof in October 2023, and the shelter and clock tower—used as climbing structures—were removed.

The demolition of these structures was guided by an experienced contractor who played a crucial role in securing the necessary building permits, a process unfamiliar to The Well's management. In addition to these changes, a security fence was installed around the building. However, this alone did not deter further incidents, as youths used a neighbouring wall to gain access. To further enhance security, alarms were updated to cover all rooms and reception areas, and the lower windows were boarded and secured. New external doors have also been fitted.
