TABLE 2 – SUMMARY OF ENVIRONMENTAL EFFECTS

The Community Plan is the sovereign strategic planning document for the delivery of all public services in East Ayrshire, providing the overarching policy and strategic framework for the delivery of services by all Partner agencies. It sets out the overall vision for the local area, as follows.

“East Ayrshire will be a place with strong, safe and vibrant communities where everyone has a good quality of life and access to opportunities, choices and high quality services which are sustainable, accessible and meet people’s needs.”

Within this context, a range of strategic and operational documents are produced, including service plans and implementation plans for the Council and Partner agencies, and strategies, such as the Local Transport Strategy, the Local Housing Strategy, the Tourism Strategy, the Culture and Leisure Strategy and the Sustainable Development Strategy.

The Community Plan has the potential to positively impact on the environment of East Ayrshire by ensuring all of the Council, as well as the Community Planning Partners’ PPSs, that arise as a result of the implementation of the Community Plan, ensure that the environment is protected and enhanced where necessary and protected from adverse impacts as far as can be reasonably predicted.

It is therefore predicted, at a fairly early stage, that the Community Plan is likely to have significant environmental impacts on the environmental issues detailed in Section 6 of Schedule 3 of the Environmental Assessment (Scotland) Act 2005. However, these likely significant environmental impacts cannot be discerned at this stage and will be identified and assessed when the Community Plan and its environmental assessment progress and before the final content of the Community Plan is decided.
